Ms. Ettingersuggestedthatthe system's commitment to finear tsbe reflected in 2.2, under Performance Indicators for Goal 1. She also

proposed including a statement similar to 1.8, but formathematics.

InBeliefStatement4,Ms.Bormelsuggestedusingamorepositive termthan"adequate."Shealsosuggestedthatinthe"Glossary,"under "AdvancedPlacementProgram(AP)",change"exempted"to"maybe exempted."Ms.Bormelsuggestedproducingacondensedversion of the *Blueprint*,thatismoreconcise,inadditiontotheoriginaldocument.

Mr.Kennedythankedthecommitteefordeletingthegoalofhaving 100% membershipinlocalPTA's.Mr.Kennedyalsoquestioneditemk, under "KeyStrategiesforGoal1," astowhetherthenumberofbooks listedistoogreat. Healsoquestionedhowthebooksarechosenandifthe readinglistincludesclassics as well as contemporary reading.

Mr.Grzymskisuggestedexpandingthewordingi nPerformance Goal2toincludeparents.HealsoaskedthatanadditionalPerformance Indicatorbeincludedtospecificallyreferencebusinessandcommunity members.

Mr.TeplitzkyexpressedhisappreciationtoMs.JohnsandMs.Audette forremovingthe educationjargonfromthe *Blueprint*,thusmakingit easiertoreadandunderstand.Hecautionedagainstshorteningthe documentassuggestedbyMs.Bormel.Mr.Teplitzkystatedthatitis criticalforpeopletounderstandhowdifficultitistomovethe system andstudentsintherightdirection.Healsoinquiredastowhether standardscouldbetiedtoPerformanceIndicatorsinthelatergoals.

Mr.HaydensuggestedexpandingKeyStrategy"e"toincludemany opportunitiesforprofessionaldevelopment forallteachers,noting thatby2005 -2006,allteacherswillneedtobe"highlyqualified."

Ms. Murray noted the importance of sharing the final document with businesses and the community.

Ms. Ettingerstatedthatitisimportantforthisdocumentto beshared withelectedofficials and others who are involved inhelping the school system realize these goals. She further stated that it is essential for every one to understand the impact of the various pieces of legislation as well as the funding atta ched to them.

Mr. Walkerexpressedhisdesiretoseeunder "KeyStrategyforGoal1," a strategywrittenspecificallyforspecialeducationstudents.

C. BoardDiscussionofDeJongReportRecommendations —Ms.Fromm, ExecutiveDirectorofPlanningandSupportOperations,introducedMs. CarolynStaskiewiczandMr.MatthewCropperofDeJong&Associates, whoprovidedaPowerPoint TMpresentationonovercrowdingatNew TownElementarySchool.

Ms.StaskiewiczstatedthatthestudentpopulationintheNorthwest Areaisprojectedtoincreaseby1,300by2010,whichis1,200overstate capacity. There is also a projection of 7,098 si nglefamilydetachedhomes planedforpossibledevelopment. Thosehomes could generate over4,000students.Itwasnotedthatboundaryadjustmentsareshort termfixes:newconstructionofatleastone.ifnottwo.elementaryschools intheNorthwestAr eaisrecommended.Othershort -termsolutionsthat couldbeconsideredareannexingabout150studentstotwoother elementaryschools, relocatables, doubles hifts, year roundschool, alternativespaces, and maintaining an enrollment cap. Ms. Staskiewic \mathbf{Z} statedDeJongrecommendsareviewoftheschoolsystem's redistricting, a capitalimprovementplan, and a district -wideFacilitiesMasterPlan.

Mr. Ar nold announced the time line for consideration of the De Jongstudy:

- FirstQuarter2003 –Worksession(s)andpubliccomment
- ➤ BoardConsiderationofRecommendations –Spring2003.

Mr.Haydennotedthatapartmentswerenotconsideredinthehousing informationpresented, which would add to the projection of 4,258 additional students. This would mean new construction of a couple elementary schools, a middle school, and a high school. He suggested coordination take place with County of ficial store fine the housing information and so County fiscal authorities have a complete understanding of the urgent need for new schools in the Northwest Area. Mr. Hayden stated that the focus hould not be on Northwest boundaries, but be expanded to adjacent areas as soon as possible.

Ms.Murrayaskediftheprojectionsincludedalargenumberofmulti familyinthearea,towhichMs.Staskiewiczrespondeditdidnot.

Mr.KennedyinquiredifStatefundswouldbeforthcomingtoassistwith thenewlawrequiringallchildr entoattendfull -daykindergartenin2007. Healsoaskediftherewouldbeclassroomstoplacethesechildren.Ms. Frommstatedthatplanstoaccommodatefull -daykindergartenstudents wereplacedinthecapitalbudget.Ms.BurnoppaddedtheStatehas formedastudygrouptolookathowtheywouldtakeonthechallengeof fundingtheadditionalspaceneeded.Mr.Kennedyspokeofthecritical needtolookatourfacilitiesonasystemwidebasisassoonaspossible.

Mr.Kennedyalsostatedthatitisno treasonabletoexpectchildrenfrom theSouthwestorNorthwestAreatotravellongdistancestoattenda schoolontheoppositesideofthecountythatmayhaveavailable classroomspace.HestatedtheCountyauthoritiesmustbeconvincedthat iftheyar egoingtodevelopareasofthecounty,theyshouldcontribute towardfundingforschoolsinthoseareas.

Ms.Jungsuggestedobtainingadditionalinformationthatwouldprovide thegeneralpatternoftheageoffamiliesandchildrenandthetimeat whichthosechildrenreachcollegeage.

Ms.Ettingerurgedstafftoconsiderfeederpatternssothatfamiliescould remainintheircommunitiesoverthelongterm.Shealsospokeofthe needtolookatschoolsintermsofprograms,notjustnumbers.Ms. EttingerspokeabouthavingthebestinformationtosharewithCountyand Stateofficialssotheyunderstandtheneeds.Sheexpressedthehopethat short termsolutionswouldhaveaminimumnegativeimpactonstudents andfamilies.

Mr.Teplitzkyvoiced hisopinionthattheState'sprocessfornew constructionisflawedbecauseschoolscan'tbebuiltbasedupon projections—thestudentsmustalreadybeinthehouses.Hesuggestedthe CountyandStatediscusstheprocessfordecidinguponnewconstruction andthesizeofnewschools.

Ms.Jungstatedthatsiteacquisitionshouldbeanon -goingprocess.

Mr.RonDapkunas, Chairofthe Adv isory Committee for Alternative Programs, described the group's successful mentoring program, now in its third year. He explained the program's objective and how the learning exercises focus on teambuilding, cooperation, and problems olving. With regard to the overcrowding report by De Jong, she noted that schools in the Northeast Area will soon face the same problems as in the Northwest, especially at the highschool level. Ms. O'Hare suggested a good charge for the advisory councils would be to assist the Board incommunicating with the elected officials. She stated that parents want their children to attend goods chools in their neighborhoods. Finally, Ms. O'Hare spoke positively of the standardized curriculum that is being developed for middles chool students.

Ms.JanThomas, are presentative of the PTAC ouncil of Baltimore County, complimented the Boardonits level of community in put on the Blue print for Progress. She shared herobservations from the pre-budget meeting sheld recently. There is some confusion in the community about the difference between the capital budget and the operating budget. PTA Council is developing a brochure to address this is sue. Ms. Thomas also shared herobservation that perhaps a better time to hold the capital budget he aring would be in the spring, rather than September. She also shared the hree to pbudget is sue sthat came out of the pre-budget meetings—teachers's a laries, class size, and technology in some form. It was not edithere is a need for a technology position in each school.
