Ms.KelliNelson,ChairoftheCitizensAdvisoryCommitteeforSpecialEducation, thankedtheBoardforhostingthegroupfordinnerthisevening.Withrespecttothe implementationofthe *NoChildLeftBehindAct* ,sheremindedtheBoardthatmanyspecial educationchildrenareinself -contained,segregatedsettings.Ms.Nelsonstatedthatwhile teacherswillberequiredtobehighlyqualified,theveryqualifiedspecialeducation teachersmay notbe,perhaps,highlyqualifiedincorecontentareas.

Mr. Carl Bailey, a member of the Citizens Advisory Committee for Special Education, noted the committee was pleased to see additional funding for special education teachers. He shared the group's concernabout the significant funding increase for non -public placement. Mr. Bailey also shared the group's interest in the 32.2 FTE's forcer tificate bound students.

Mr.MichaelFranklin,PresidentofthePTACouncilofBaltimoreCounty,sharedPTA's supportofthepro posedbudget.Heexpressedhisbeliefthattheschoolsystemdeservesfull fundingofthebudgetrequest.Hestatedfundingauthoritiesneedtorealizethataworld -class educationcostsmoney.Mr.FranklinagreedwithanearliercommentmadebyMr.Kenn edywith regardtopayingprofessionalstaffwhattheydeserveorrisklosingthem.

Mr.MarkBeytin,PresidentoftheTeachersAssociationofBaltimoreCounty, commentedonCountyExecutiveJamesSmith'scommitmenttoeducationasputforthinhis "BlueprintforEducationinBaltimoreCounty."Mr.Beytinnotedtherearemanypositive proposalsinthebudgetrequest,andhecommendedBoardmembersfortheirdesiretoraise salaries,buthenotedthatifnegotiationscontinuetogointhecurrentdirection andsalary increasesforteachersarenotpartofthebudgetpackage,hefearsdecimationoftheteaching force.

TherewerenospeakerstotestifyontheproposedrevisionstoPolicy3124 —Accounting andCashManagement.

Dr.GeorgeHohl,representingt heAssociationofElementarySchoolAdministrators (AESA),spokeaboutthreeissues.First,Dr.HohlurgedtheBoardtoincludeinthebudget requestallofthenecessaryfundstoreachthegoalsinthe *BlueprintforProgress*, aswellasto becompetitive withothermajorschoolsystemsinthearea.TheBoardwasurgedtopropose thetotalpackageneededfortheschoolsystemtomoveforwardatafasterpace.Second,Dr. HohlsharedAESA'sbeliefthatisittimetoeliminatetheTABCOTeacherPerception Survey. Hestatedthatmorepositive,productivewaystodetermineperceptionsofparentsandschool staffcouldbeinvaluable.Finally,Dr.Hohlrequestedthateducatorsateverylevelbeproactive inshapingtheimplementationofthe *NoChildLeftBehi ndAct* intoamanageableform.

Ms.PamelaWilliams,aRandallstownHighSchoolparent,notedtheovercrowdingatthe schoolandrequestedimmediaterelief.Shealsoaskedforadditionaltimeforstaff developmentfortheschool'steachers.
