Our students are like the flower that I brought as a gift to you. It needs nourishment and if it got sick, it needs the right doctor,

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the right prescription.

So, every Superintendent before you talked about diversity, talked about inclusion, talked about equity and equality. Very little was done. Dr. Berger, in about 1995, closed the schools on Jewish holidays because that's his holiday. Dr. Hairston came in, he was a status quo Superintendent. He actually gave the impression, wrongfully to all of us, that it is a state-sponsored holiday which was false.

Then, this past June in this calendar, professional day was supposed to be coinciding with Eid al-Fitr. The school administration basically made it an open day. School administration sacrificed our culture, our faith, and did not do the same thing for our Jewish cousins. If that's not really a discrimination, I honestly don't know what discrimination is.

Another observation is that over the past 15 years, I have yet to see one Muslim teacher come in and be an employee. I have yet to see a

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Sikh teacher with a turban. There might be some, I don't know. I don't have statistics.

But, it's such a drastic ban on Muslims in Baltimore County Public Schools that is hidden, clandestine and is being done in a very consistent way.

So, you are our hope. You are our hope for the buildings and for the people inside. Our students, and I'm really glad to see Mr. Rashid here. Our students are really no different than any other faith or national origin. All what I am asking is really for this Board and every member and you, as our administrator, is to treat the Jewish holidays equal to the Muslim holidays.

Equal must mean equal. It cannot be parsed. It cannot be manipulated. It cannot be done in a smart way. It really cannot. My personal hope is that you would implement that after 25 years of me being involved with the school system. It's about time. Thank you and welcome.

Dr. Williams knows what I'm talking about. We were such a diverse high school and, with all the years and experience he has now, the potential of what he could absolutely do for Team BCPS. I am so excited and welcome to the family.

I am just full of joy. I hope that everybody is getting ready. But shout-out to all our administrators, they're doing a lot of hiring. I know the HR Department and they're working very hard. Do you see all those people back there? They're getting promoted. So, that means they're getting more staff. So, that's awesome.

I am just so confident of what the future is going to look like for Baltimore County and how we're going to make Baltimore County better. Also, I'm urging BCPS to give new counselors extensive training about how to work with students, especially the middle and the high school students due to the sensitivity of their age and their special face of mental perception

appropriate progressive track for their age.

Upon research, I've come up with a lot of findings that I'm deeply concerned about as a parent and a taxpayer in this county. I want to understand why nearly 61 percent of the students in the 4th grade are not reading proficient. I want to understand why, amongst our county's 8th grade students, only 31 percent are capable of getting a B or higher in Algebra. I want to understand how the SAT scores have dropped from 2013 at a 1,322, to 2018 at a 977. I want to 12 understand why 75 percent of applicants to CCBC are not able to pass a 7th grade Accuplacer exam. 14 Most of these applicants are coming from BCPS.

I pay one third less the cost than you're paying per student in this county and, in one year's time, my students have gone from not being able to recognize an adjective or an adverb, to writing an MLA format and deriving Latin. It makes no sense to me why our students in the county are so far behind or why I should pay the

taxes and then pay again just to be able to get my children educated at a college-ready level.

It's the onus of responsibility on all of us. The Board, the staff, the teachers, the administrators, to do better than this by our kids. Education is the backbone of our community and if we don't do something about this, we will lose our community. The students can't read. They can't do math.

Dr. Williams, my students, my children, they didn't know their basic math facts. They couldn't long divide. I had to hire two tutors this year to being them up. It should not be the case.

I implore you as you're learning to broad scope your investigation so that you can improve this for the students. Thank you.

5 Good evening, Dr. McComas and Dr. Adams.

MR. MCCOMAS: Good evening, Dr. Williams and Chair Causey and Chair Henn and members of the Board. Dr. Adams and myself are here tonight to bring forward an update on the opening process to support Watershed Public Charter School.

What you see before you tonight on this slide is really airing our outcome for this evening which I mentioned is to provide an 14 informational update. We know our Board likes frequent updates and that's what we are in the process of doing. I think our last one was in May.

Our next slide, just to center everyone in the work, what you have here is a map of Baltimore County schools. The red dots identify student who are on a wait list, the blue dots

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identify students who have been accepted to

2 Watershed. You can see that the spread of

students really does fan out around the full

county and, therefore, as a result of the wide

spread, we don't have any singular Baltimore

County school that draws so many students that it

affects staffing at any of their other schools.

In terms of the informational updates, as I said before, our last Board update was provided 10 in May and, at that time, we brought you an update as to where curriculum and development was at that time and facilities at that time. Tonight, our update will focus on facilities as

they are currently, informational technology and

15 student enrollment.

> DR. ADAMS: Good evening. With the facilities status as of July, you may remember that BCPS and Watershed, we've been communicating about the facility, specifically, we had

19 20 mentioned in May that the health suite was one of

the sole remaining issues regarding facility

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equipment remain.

suitability and I also wanted to remind the Board

that the facility must be deemed suitable for

instruction by BCPS in order for the school to 4 open.

Based on our current understanding and a recent visit, permits have been accepted and renovations are underway. The health suite was a remaining area of concern. On June 2nd, 2019, Watershed provided responses to our feedback on their construction plans.

BCPS then responded to Watershed on June 12 13th stating that the school's proposed solution to the health suite requirement was not 14 acceptable. Watershed proposed provided a sound-reducing curtain in order to create the 16 required private consultation space. This solution is not in accordance with COMAR which requires a separate room for private consultation and for use as a designated school health services professional's offices. Watershed was notified that the health suite needed to be

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renovated to meet the requirements of state law.

On June 22nd, following a meeting that included BCPS staff, Watershed leadership and MSDE, MSDE informed Watershed and BCPS that, despite system concerns, MSDE would be waiving the requirement for a private consultation space. So, with that requirement waived, only discussions around food, nutrition and kitchen

BCPS staff and health department staff from Baltimore County have a final inspection and my records say that that is scheduled for July 10th. So, within the next week, we have a health inspection on the kitchen.

In terms of information technology, I wanted to share an update on BCPS and Watershed discussions. At this time, Watershed has decided that the school will not use the BCPS wide area network or our internet connections and fiber. Our wide area network and fiber provide a number of services and support and this decision has

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several implications.

This decision has the following
ramifications that potentially impact employee
efficiencies, student and staff safety, privacy
of data and possibly instruction. Our security
cameras, door buzzer system and payroll system
for non-exempt employees are all predicated on
the use of our network and fiber.

Therefore, Watershed will not use our camera system. They have agreed to use the same camera company and system but integration between their system and ours is not guaranteed. It is something we're working on. Because Watershed will not be on our network, the school will not have a secure connection to the Department of Safety or the Baltimore County police department for emergency response.

In addition, they will have their own unique door buzzer and entry system. As you know in BCPS, we use a one-card system that grants staff access to buildings based on their role and

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based on my role and my permissions, the system allows me to go and see and do what I'm expected to do and doesn't allow me to go someplace that I'm not.

Without this, the other thing that active directory support does is it allows us to roster teachers and students to curricular materials and resources within the learning management system. So, for example, the Wanderers reading resources are rostered to students through their connections to a homeroom teacher.

So, without that active directory support, students and staff will not have access to digital curricular resources. In addition, teachers will have to connect to the BCPS system using our virtual private network in order to access the systems that live behind our firewall.

An example of such would be in order to take daily attendance, students have to access the student information system but the student information system lives behind our firewall.

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ID badge. For example, our safety managers have access to all the schools in their area with just a single ID.

Watershed's safety manager will have to have two door swipes, as will the community superintendent and the Executive Director of School Support.

Additionally, since they will not be on our network, payroll, time and attendance for non-exempt employees will have to manually tracked, submitted and processed. We anticipate for the first year that this will affect three staff members at Watershed Public Charter School.

Without access to our network and fiber, active directory support for student and staff accounts cannot be provided. Active directory support is the system by which we use unique staff and student IDs to provide both with access to required systems.

In layman's terms, I'm RAdams in our system and when I log into my device and BCPS One

So, with Watershed teachers not on our network and our fiber, they would have to log into our virtual private network in order to take attendance.

One of the other reasons that they would need to do this is any required password changes. So, our system requires us to change our password at a particular frequency. In order to do that you had to be connected to the network.

Lastly, this decision to not use our wide area network and fiber means that Watershed would need to identify its own internet filtering system for K-12 students and also have in place a firewall system to protect student and staff data as both are required.

Finally, I wanted to provide an update on student enrollment at the charter school. Dr. McComas shared with you the map of accepted and wait listed students and I know that, based on recent conversations with Principal Jayman, that there is a longer wait list now than there was

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originally.

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Charter school funding is provided by BCPS and is dependent on that enrollment and, as you know, MSDE requires us to provide an official enrollment count by school each September. So, as a reminder to the Board, Watershed has a target enrollment of 176 students. That enrollment ensures approximately \$2 million in BCPS funding which supports their 17 and a half FTE and anything left over could be used for educational programming.

I have an update. When my Windows presentation was uploaded into Board Docs, their enrollment was 123. As of this morning, the enrollment is 129 of the 176 accepted students.

Based on the information we have about their budget, Watershed has very little margin of error should their September enrollment not reach their target of 176 students. Meaningful under-enrollment may impair their operations and provisions of the educational program.

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Therefore, we continue to encourage leadership at the school to efficiently verify and enroll accepted students into their program in order to support the educational program as intended.

This concludes our summary of where we are with opening the school. We continue to work with them and support them. Not even quite two weeks ago, we had our latest school opening meeting with Watershed and we have additional meetings scheduled. Just yesterday, as you know, we received additional written feedback from them.

We wish them to be successful and we will continue to provide appropriate levels of support. With that, Dr. McComas and I are prepared to take any questions you might have.

BOARD CHAIR CAUSEY: Thank you, Dr. Adams. Ms. Mack, I saw your hand go up earlier. Then, we'll work around to other Board members.

MS. MACK: Hi, Dr. Adams. Thank you. You referenced an email that Watershed staff, I

mean, a letter that they sent yesterday that refutes quite a bit of what you said. I don't know if you want to take the time to go

point-by-point but I think some of it is very important.

DR. ADAMS: If that would be the Board's desire. I have a copy of the letter. I can certain speak to things in the letter that I, I know it was referenced in the letter quite a bit, that I spoke to myself and there are some other components that would probably be more appropriate for Mr. Dixit to speak to.

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didn't have a principal in place at the beginning of the fourth marking period, that it would be most appropriate for the teachers to not receive the curriculum until they were accepted and had agreed to transfer to the school.

At the same time, Ms. Shay and I have had multiple meetings with Watershed about curriculum dating back to last December as we've detailed in weekly updates and previous communication to the Board. So, without integration or using the same system, Dr. Ford or an officer or a resource officer assigned to those area elementary schools would have to toggle back and forth between those systems which takes a little bit more time and I think we would all agree that, in an emergency response, every second counts.

So, that's just something, again, like 10 Dr. McComas said, we want you to be aware of what the implications of the decisions are.

MS. MACK: Okay. Thank you, Dr. McComas, for that. I think what I find very confusing is this discussion about enrollment. I think you updated the 123 to 129.

DR. ADAMS: Uh-huh (affirmative). MS. MACK: My question is how can we only 18 have 129 students enrolled when we have 409 19 students that have applied and we have a waiting list. So, how can we have a waiting list when we haven't filled every available seat?

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DR. ADAMS: That is a great question. So, if I could use a different example and think about our magnet programs. My son, who is a recent graduate, applied to several magnet programs and was accepted into several magnet programs. So, at one point, each of those high school programs believed my son was coming to their school.

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He only went to the school that we went to and said this is definitely the one that he's coming to which was Western. With enrollment, if I'm the parent and my son or daughter has been accepted as a seat, I still need to bring all of my paperwork to the school and then the principal or the admin secretary then completes the enrollment within the system.

So, I can't theorize. My theory would be that you have parents who have accepted seats but they have not brought their paperwork to the school to then allow Principal Jayman or their admin secretary to enroll the student into the

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system which would then put that student into their bucket.

MS. MACK: Is there an issue where students are being unenrolled from the SIS system?

DR. ADAMS: So, what we found was there was a day of glitches where it appeared one or two students, this did come up in the last school opening meeting, it appeared as if one or two students somehow were unenrolled. Since our enrollment rolled over on July 1st, we have not been able to replicate that glitch. When I first heard of it which was before the school opening meeting, I contacted someone in Mr. Corns' shop. That person was able to show me that at that time they had an enrollment of 120 and then there were 9 pending enrollments that had been started in the system but weren't complete.

But, the most recent occurrence that we've got is an order to alleviate some of the need for consistent VPN connection. We're going to be able to put a light-duty point-to-point wireless access point in the front office which will allow the secretary, who is going to need to be on the SIS basically all day, to have access to that.

So, when we talk about what this looks like, this is the only school in BCPS that will be set up this way. So, that will be a little bit of uncharted territory.

So, some of the bits that we need to work out is the VPN tunnel. Are we going to do split traffic or are we going to run everything through that tunnel? If we run everything through that tunnel, then it cuts off local access to all the resources. But, if we do split traffic, is it going to route the right way? So, there's just

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some unknowns that we're working through.

As Dr. McComas and Dr. Adams were both saying, I don't see anything in here that's going to stop this progress. We just need to be cognizant of the fact that, of the schools we have set up, this will be the one that is an outlier.

VICE CHAIR HENN: All right. Will your team be reviewing the filtering that is in place for access?

MR. CORNS: Not necessarily.

VICE CHAIR HENN: Okay. Does that give you any pause or concern in terms of what content students will be able to access?

MR. CORNS: So, when it comes down to 16 content, we always will address directly to parents, what the parent concern is. I can speak only locally and immediately that we deal with a lot of internal calls about what a parent may deem as appropriate or inappropriate content. You and I have had conversations through meetings

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as well.

So. I think with the confidence I'd have to put in, when we say SIPPA requirements, they are all centered around obscene and pornographic images. That is the federal law. That is the floor of what we filter.

Now, we can dialogue about what that means. If I only set our filter to obscene and pornographic images, the content that would be above and beyond that would be not appropriate.

The belief that I have around Watershed's capabilities of doing that, I don't know that I can say one way or the other whether or not they will be able to filter in a way that would make their parents comfortable. But, I believe that would be a conversation between the school and the parents in this scenario.

For years, I've been talking about trauma and trauma-informed practices and that was the entire focus of the whole thing and it was really fantastic. I'm really happy that, as a school system, we're addressing the experiences that children have that cause them to come into the classroom unavailable to learn and that because of these different techniques that these people in our 14 school system are actively learning about and teaching others about, we can help these children 16 in ways that are not complicated or difficult to learn. It really does make all the difference in 18 the world.

I had a lot of trauma in my upbringing and I had a 3rd grade teacher and she made the difference. She was a mandatory reporter. She

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went to court to fight for me and she brushed my hair every day. She made sure that other kids didn't pick on me, that they understood that it's okay to be different and everyone has different experiences.

For that one teacher, to make a difference in my life, it mattered. It mattered a lot. It made a difference between my outcome today and what my outcome could have been and what the outcome of some of my peers in similar situations is very different.

So, I would like to encourage every teacher in our school system that when you have that difficult child who does things that don't make sense to you, just remember that just being kind, just trying to understand and a little bit of patience can make the difference in that child's entire outcome for their entire life and one person really can make that kind of difference in another person's life.
