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Six schools honored for outstanding participation in Green 60

Two-week environmental activism campaign was led by Baltimore County Student Councils

Towson, MD – Six schools were honored in the inaugural "Green 60: Our Planet, Our Home" interschool challenge coordinated by the Baltimore County Student Councils (BCSC) Environmental Committee.

The challenge, held April 12 – 23, encouraged students to earn points for their schools by participating in sustainable practices.
